Pastor's Reflection

Living in the Miraculous

As we move through the Lenten Season, looking forward to Easter, I invite you to come deeply and purposefully into the Gospel. Our future can be shaped by the news, social media, the challenges of our time, and the pressures of society. Regardless of your age or station in life, these external influences can have a life-shaping effect on both your experiences and your outlook. This becomes a serious conversation when you consider the teen suicide rate, and children report that they have extreme anxiety. On another point, churches face their own set of social changes that affect their future. Families find themselves stretched to the breaking point, and tensions from the workplace spill into home life. Overlapping schedules sometimes create the perfect storm of stress in the household. Add to that the financial stress, the stress of being a Facebook-perfect family. Standing in all that noise and stress, I wholeheartedly invite you to look toward Easter, not for yet another family event or a most go-to service, but because there is a truth to be celebrated that takes us beyond the circumstances, we find ourselves in.

Jesus comes to us not from an ivory tower, or removed from the messiness, nor the pain of life. Jesus placed himself at the heart of our issues; he called us to be better to the poor, the sick, and the outsider. But he did more than call us out; he taught us how to live in the absolute abundance of God, to provide what we need; he taught us to have hearts full of grace for one another; and he taught us how to live in the life-giving and renewing spirit of God. One of my favorite stories that demonstrates the truths Jesus teaches us is the story of the Samaritan woman at the well.

John 4:7-15

7 A Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' ⁸(His disciples had gone to the city to buy food.) ⁹The Samaritan woman said to him, 'How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?' (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans.) ¹⁰Jesus answered her, 'If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, "Give me a drink", you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water.' ¹¹The woman said to him, 'Sir, you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? ¹²Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob, who gave us the well, and with his sons and his flocks drank from it?' ¹³Jesus said to her, 'Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, ¹⁴but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life.' ¹⁵The woman said to him, 'Sir, give me this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water.'

Here, Jesus picks an outsider, a woman who would have been an outcast in society, to demonstrate the life-giving love of God. If she will only trust Jesus and walk with him by giving him water, he will, in return, give her living water that will never run out! That is the life-renewing spirit that we experience and the love and grace of God if we will only come to drink from Jesus's cup!

Another favorite story is the feeding of the five thousand, not counting the women and children, with two fish and five loaves of bread.

Matthew 14:17-21

17They replied, 'We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish.' 18And he said, 'Bring them here to me.' 19Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. 20And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. 21And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

In this story, we find ourselves in the place Jesus is calling us into a divine truth beyond our logic, yet perfect in the truth of God's power. We find we can care for one another beyond what we think is possible if we step out in faith.

In our beloved little country church, we strive to make the Gospel truth our truth, shaping our actions. The world's view of the church would lead us to believe that few families care about it, yet we have a stream of children, accompanied by their families, coming down the aisles every Sunday. Praise be to God and the dedication of their parents and our wonderful Sunday school teachers. The world would say teens do not have the time or the interest in the church or the Gospel and yet we are so thrilled to celebrate or teens that are doing so much in our church to serve, to bring joy to the least of this through their mission work, this first Lenten service our youth will be serving the meal with the help of their parents and adult support. Again, we thank God, their dedicated parents, and the supportive adults who are there for them. In a time when the world would say it is divided and to hold on to what you have, we move further out in mission to care for our neighbors. Today, we will fill an SUV with food and head to Kindercottage, a mission started many years ago by the UCC and the Presbyterian Church to support the families in East St. Louis who are certainly struggling to make ends meet. The photos of the parents' faces, full of gratitude, tell the story as they receive the food. Again, where does it come from? How is this possible? Our little country church makes sure children and families have food. Take all the love and care that flows out of this little country church, and you would say, praise the Lord and all those many organizations and volunteers and loving members that hear the cries of others and respond in the absolute truth of the Loaves and Fishes Lord we serve. As we move toward Easter, lean into the truth of the Gospel. Pull away from the influences of the world that would divide us from one another, that would say there is not enough, not enough youth that care, not enough parents that put church first, not enough money to feed the poor, not enough time for church. Live in the absolute abundance of God's resources, love, grace, fulfillment, and such joy! Move forward, looking toward Easter and purposefully moving ever deeper into the Truth of the Gospel.
